
# Bird Eating Bird Poems: A National Poetry Series Anthology

#### \* Ocean Vuong, "On Earth We're Briefly Gorgeous":

>In the kingdom of childhood >There was no password >No visa or curfew >You only had to know the way >You only had to know to knock >And to say the right words.

Bird Eating Bird Poems is a powerful and moving collection that showcases the best of contemporary American poetry. The five poets featured in this anthology are all rising stars, and their work is sure to leave a lasting impression on readers.



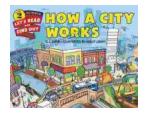
