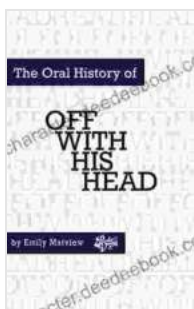


The Oral History of Offwithhishead: A Decade of Noise, Love, and Loss

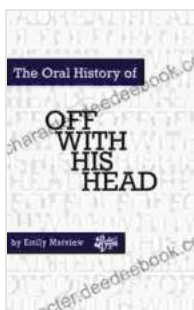

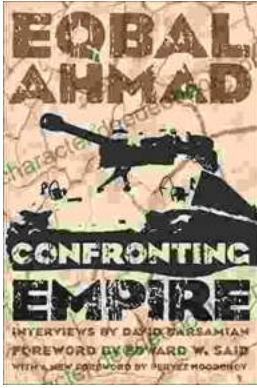

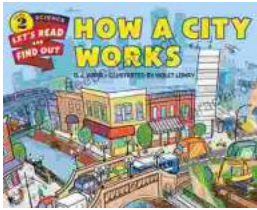
