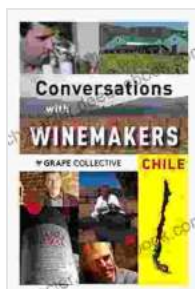


Your Guide to Chilean Wine Conversations With Winemakers

In our conversation, Baettig shared his insights on the Chilean wine industry, the challenges and rewards of winemaking in Chile, and his plans for the future of Viña Vik.

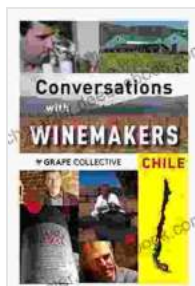

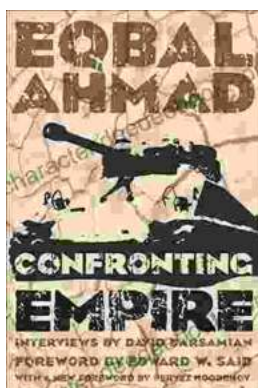


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
